Regulatory Update

- New guidance released for vaccine billing change set to begin July 1, 2025
 - RHCs will bill for Medicare vaccines (Hep B, Pneumo, Flu, and COVID) at time of service
 - CMS Guidance
 - Still awaiting guidance on cost report settlement details





Updates from Congress

- Rapidly approaching government funding cliff (March 14) and expiration of Medicare telehealth flexibilities (March 31)
- Senate is busy with confirmation hearings of President Trump's nominees and many agencies are operating without full leadership
 - RFK Jr. confirmed as HHS Secretary
 - Tom Engels, HRSA Administrator (also served in this role 2019-2021)
 - Confirmation hearings for Dr. Oz as CMS Administrator have not yet been scheduled



Reconciliation Update

- The House will vote on their multi-trillion dollar budget resolution this week, the first step in utilizing "reconciliation" this Congress
 - Reconciliation allows for faster consideration of tax/spending/debt limit legislation
 - The resolution gives spending / cutting blueprints to different Congressional committees
- The House and Senate must agree on identical budget resolutions, right now they are not the same
 - For example, the House resolution proposes \$880 billion in programs under Energy and Commerce (very likely to include Medicaid)
 - Medicaid cut proposals include per-capita caps, work requirements



RHCs and Medicaid

- RHCs, unlike FQHCs, do not receive any funding to provide care for uninsured patients
- If Medicaid policy reforms increase the number of uninsured patients that RHCs are treating, it will increase the likelihood of RHC closures

Average payer mix for Rural Health Clinics:

31% Commercially Insured
30% Medicaid
22% Traditional Medicare
12% Medicare Advantage
5% Uninsured



Government Funding Update

- The reconciliation process is completely separate from Congress' responsibility to fund the federal government
 - If Congress cannot come to an agreement on federal spending levels for the rest of FY2025 by March 14 (17 days from today!), the government will shut down
 - Republicans do need Dem votes to pass a federal budget

Telehealth Update

- Current Medicare telehealth flexibilities are set to expire on March 31 without Congressional action
 - Patients will no longer be able to access medical telehealth services from their homes or other non-specified medical facilities (RHCs, FQHCs, CAHs in rural areas)
- Ensure your Members of Congress know the impacts of telehealth and the need for these extensions

Other NARHC Priorities – 119th Congress

- Medicare Advantage Reimbursement Reform
 - Increasing frustration from Members that have historically been very pro-MA as they are hearing more of its challenges from providers and patients (keep this up!)
- Reintroducing elements of the RHC Burden Reduction Act
 - Aligning federal regulations with NP/PA state scope of practice
 - Fixing the RHC eligibility locations to keep status quo since "urbanized / nonurbanized areas" are no longer defined by the Census Bureau
 - Removing limitations on the amount of behavioral health services billable in RHCs
